

The Arizona ESA Homeschool Planner

Turn your ESA funds into a full year of learning that actually sticks

If you're homeschooling in Arizona with an ESA, you have something powerful: **real money to build the education you want for your kid**. You also have a real challenge nobody warns you about — no one hands you a plan for how to spend it well, cover every subject, and *know* your kid is actually on track.

That's what this planner is for. It's short on purpose. Fifteen minutes with a pen and you'll have:

- a plan for the year,
- a way to spend your ESA funds without waste, and
- a simple weekly check so you always know where your kid stands.

No account, no login. Print it and go.

Part 1 — Spend your ESA funds on purpose (not in a panic)

Your award. Check your current award amount in ClassWallet. For most families it's several thousand dollars per child, per year — enough to build a real education *if* you spend it on purpose.

The “Is it worth it?” filter — ask these 3 questions before any purchase

1. **Does it do a job?** Move a subject forward (core), fill a gap (support), or spark curiosity (enrichment) — or is it just shiny?
2. **Will we use it every week?** Or is it a one-time thing that ends up in a closet?
3. **The other-mom test.** If you explained this purchase to another homeschool mom, would she nod — or raise an eyebrow?

Your simple ESA budget (fill this in)

Common approved categories include curriculum, tutoring, online learning programs, educational materials, testing, and more — always verify against your current ESA Parent Handbook before you buy.

Part 2 — Your whole year on one page

List your subjects, one line each. **Done beats perfect** — you can adjust as you go.

Part 3 — The 15-minute weekly “on-track” check

This is the most important page in this planner. Falling behind never happens in one week — it happens in **ten un-checked weeks**. Fifteen minutes, once a week, is how you catch it early. It's the difference between “my kid is on track” being a *hope* and being a *fact*.

Every week, for each kid, answer 4 questions: 1. What did we actually cover this week (vs. what we planned)? 2. Where did they get **stuck**? 3. Did they get **unstuck** — or is it carrying over to next week? 4. One **win** to celebrate.

Part 4 — The subjects you dread

Every homeschool parent has one or two subjects that just aren't their strength. **That's not a failure — you can't be an expert in everything.**

The goal isn't to become a math teacher overnight. It's to make sure your kid can get **unstuck in that subject even when you can't be the one to do it.** Your options: - A tutor (ESA-payable, but pricey and on their schedule) - An online program (helpful, but it doesn't adapt to *your* kid) - A co-op (great, but not there the moment they're stuck at the kitchen table) - An AI tutor (on-demand, adapts to your kid — see the next page)

Part 5 — Want all of this done *for* you?

You just mapped everything that goes into keeping a homeschooler on track — the planning, the weekly check, and the subjects you have to cover even when they're not your strength. It's real work, **every single week.**

That's exactly why I built **OSQR.**

OSQR is an AI tutor that: - works through your kid's **own materials** (snap a photo of any workbook page and it tutors from it), - **remembers** exactly where they get stuck and adapts to how they learn, - keeps the **running record of every week** — so your 15-minute check takes two: just ask it the four questions, and - is there the **moment** your kid needs help — even in the subjects you'd rather not teach.

And it's built for parents who are wary of AI (I'm one of them):

- Your kid's data is **never used to train AI** — not by us, and not by the AI providers we use
- **COPPA-compliant** kid accounts with parent-set controls: tutor intensity, daily time limits, tool on/off switches
- **You see everything** from your parent portal — plus automatic alerts if your kid seems to be struggling
